2023 started out with a bang after the second half of 2022 saw a stalled market in many sectors in the local real estate market. Buyers gained power back as the market shifted. Interest rates peaked over 7% last Fall. This year they have been down to 6% and up close to 7%. Currently they are in the low to mid 6% territory.

The Washington, DC, area and many local markets have less than 1 month supply of housing inventory, with an extremely strong sellers' market. In Arlington County, VA, the median sold price for Single Family Homes for March was \$1,250,000, representing an increase of 10.5% compared to February 2023 and an increase of 4.2% from March 2022. The average days on market for units sold in March was 29 days, 21% above the 5-year March average of 24 days. There was a 55.8% month over month increase in new contract activity with 81 New Pendings; a 12.6% Month over Month increase in all Pendings (new contracts + contracts carried over from February) to 98; and a 22.1% increase in supply to 116 active units. Bottom line – we have a historic low supply of housing inventory and buyers have few choices compared to pre-pandemic years.

Bill Schweigart: In "The Guilty One," Patrol Officer Cal Farrell is the first on scene to an active shooter event in Old Town. He stops the shooter...but remembers nothing about it. Six months later, he's a detective and the darling of the local press when he makes a grisly discovery: a body hanging impossibly high on a

tree. As more bodies begin to stack up, Cal has to unlock his memories if he hopes to catch the killer dubbed "Old Town Jack" or else there are those who are only too happy to make him the guilty one.

**BN:** What distinguishes Cal from other detectives?

**Schweigart:** There's a lot of detective fiction out there where the detective is haunted and obsessed, and though Cal has been through a

lot, he's no dark avenger. He's actively trying to be a better person. He's always narrowing the gap between where he is and his best self.


saving his family and saving the city. As in any Patterson story, twists and turns abound! And I made sure to move the climax back to Arling-

provided food for distribution at two nearby sites. The distribution is on Monday evenings, and there are usually 12 to 20 people at each site, collecting food for their families. The current group of volunteers are looking for additions to our group, especially as some of us have summer travel plans. It is not a weekly commitment, but a vehicle is necessary.

Each week, a volunteer with a large car or van drives out to Route 50 and Prosperity in Fairfax to pick up milk crates full of fresh produce. We usually receive between 18 to 24 crates. This

The driver then returns the empty crates to a location in Barcroft and is done for the week. The other two volunteers drive the bagged food to two locations nearby. The first distribution is at 6 p.m. and the second at 6:30 p.m. All is all, it is about two hours of time for all involved.

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# Shopping for the Birds

Warm weather has many of us headed to the garden center, where lovely blooms await. Did you know that those shopping trips can double as one of the most effective ways to contribute to a healthier environment? With a little planning, our plant choices can make the difference between a community that supports the birds and butterflies and a community that completely displaces them. The key is to pick native plants, the ones that evolved right here with those critters and provide them the food they need to survive. Native trees and shrubs are especially important, but even the tiniest plants play an important role in the ecosystem.

How do you tell if a plant is native to

our area? A simple way is to look for the red "Northern Virginia Native" stickers at participating nurseries. Over fifty volunteers from the Plant NOVA Natives campaign have been labeling the natives in those garden centers. The trees get hang tags, and the other plants get red stickers. You won't find

the stickers in the annuals sections, though, since those plants are purely ornamental and not locally native. Since turnover is rapid this time of year, making it hard for volunteers to



keep up with the labeling, you might want to take along a copy of the Native Plants for Northern Virginia guide, or use the online pdf or search app.

An even simpler way to guarantee that a plant is native is to buy it from someone who only sells native plants. There are four garden centers in Northern Virginia that do just that. In addition, periodic native plant sale events are held around the region in the spring and the fall.

Spring planting for many people consists primarily of filling pots with colorful flowers. The absence of annuals might seem like a problem until you learn that native plants make excellent container specimens as well, with the added advantage that they only need

to be planted once, since they will over-winter in the pot and provide the fun of watching their tender leaves emerge in the spring. Visits to the blooms from butterflies and humming-birds add even more enjoyment. The

Plant NOVA Natives website has plant suggestions for container gardening, but almost any native can be used for this purpose if the container is big enough. •
