March BSCL Meeting

The March BSCL meeting was by far the busiest meeting of the year! In addition to many Barcrofters, the meeting was attended by a member of the Arlington Forest Citizens Association, two members of the Carlton Condominium who wanted to lay the groundwork for future joint efforts, and three representatives from Arlington County.

We discussed Neighborhood Conservation and Advisory Committee (NCAC) funding for additional neighborhood improvements, possibly for neighborhood signs. We also discussed the Barcroft-Arlington Forest path. The Arlington Forest property owner attending the meeting voiced his concerns (see related article).

The featured topic was a discussion of traffic circles with Jeff Sikes of the County's planning staff, who discussed possible designs for the 8th and Taylor intersection. The BSCL had expressed concerns over increased traffic that may occur if 8th St. is modified to include a curb and sidewalk to the southeast of the intersection. We asked the County staff to consider adding a traffic circle. Mr. Sikes stated that a circle would not work at this intersection. He thought that the relatively minor curb and gutter changes to the intersection should not significantly affect traffic volume or speed. A motion was adopted to proceed with the improvements discussed in December.

Mr. Sikes had also examined the feasibility of adding a traffic circle to the 3rd and Pershing intersection and has concluded that a small (25-ft diameter) traffic circle would reduce speeding on Pershing. No formal action was taken on the 3rd and Pershing intersection.

Remembering Marvon McKinney

Barcroft-Arlington Forest Pathway in Jeopardy

As many Barcrofters know, a path joins the Barcroft neighborhood with the Arlington Forest neighborhood to the west. The Barcroft entrance is on S. Abingdon St. across from S. 5th St. The Arlington Forest entrance is adjacent to the house at 101 S. Aberdeen St. Although the Barcroft portion of the path has a recorded legal right of way, no records have been found documenting the path in the Arlington Forest neighborhood. The owner of that property is concerned that if the path that crosses his property is not formally managed by Arlington County, he may be liable for accidents that may occur.

Although the County-published Barcroft Neighborhood Conservation Plan recommends

that the path and County-installed bridge be maintained and improved (Rec. 23C), Arlington County does not object to the proposal to close the Arlington Forest portion. At the March BSCL meeting, a motion passed requesting that Arlington County formalize the path to ensure its continued existence and to protect the Arlington Forest property owner. Before making the request to the County, the BSCL intends to discuss the proposal at the next Arlington Forest Citizen's Association meeting.

Memories of Marvon McKinney

[From the Editor: We inadvertently left off the byline for the touching tribute to Marvon McKinney published in the March issue of the Barcroft News. Randy Swart, our erstwhile Contributions Editor (and writer of most of the newsletter) was the author. His piece prompted additional comments from other neighbors. The following are two notes we have received.]

I have lived in Barcroft for 10 years on S. 8th St. For most of those years I have run, weather and temperament permitting, a course that always included a pass by Mr. McKinney's garden. I looked forward to seeing what he was up to, wondered what he did when he wasn't outside (did he ever watch TV? I doubted it.), and anticipated my return by his garden, when he always seemed to have timed me and gave me some warm words of encouragement to get me through the rest of the run home.

He reminded me of my father, a native of Indiana. Dad also rode a bike, long before it was cool. Both were a bit eccentric, and I felt a kindred spirit in the "Barcroft Farmer." I had hoped I would get to know him better this year.

This has been a particularly hard and sad winter for many of us, but I must say that the loss of our neighbor and friend struck a tragic note for me that will repeat itself every time I

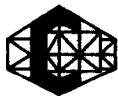
see the empty garden, the empty house. I can't quite accept the loss.

If there is anything we as a community can do to preserve his property, to keep the bulldozers out, to plant trees and make a park or memorial, I would like to help. Spring, as welcome as it will be, will not be the same without him. Not at all.

I read [the] sensitive piece in the March 1994 *Barcroft News* on Marvon McKinney. I simply wanted to let you know how much I appreciated your thoughtfulness in informing the neighbors about this interesting gentleman.

Like so many other neighbors in the Barcroft area, I stopped and talked with Mr. McKinney on numerous occasions, sometimes in the afternoon, but more often in the evening or even late at night while walking or jogging. We chatted mostly about the neighborhood, about his "farm," about agriculture in general, and about politics. He knew that I work in the Congress and pumped me frequently about current events and world affairs. He also sought information about pesticides, safe foods, and other agriculture subjects. He was always a gentleman, never overbearing, rarely imposing, always interesting. His personality and presence were far more benign and friendly than his



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seeming shyness and dark hulking shadow there in his farm late at night.

Like others, I had the notion that it would be a valuable act to sit down with a tape recorder and learn about his farming techniques and know-how. Alas, that was never done. That too is a big loss.

Again thank you for your informative and sensitive piece. I read it with interest and eagerness. Such pieces rarely appear in conventional news outlets. Congratulations.

Shauna then moved to Washington, DC, to work with the Lutheran Volunteer Corps at Christ House, a medical facility for homeless men. Ken decided to follow her here, and in the fall of 1989, he got a job at Washington-Lee High School teaching earth science. At the lab, the children had the opportunity to visit six different stations. At one, a child was hauled up a flag pole by using pulleys. At another, chil-

dren attempted to climb over a haywagon with and without an inclined board to help them. Another group used a screw jack to lift up a truck. Another activity had them tie ropes to different-shaped objects to see which were easier to pull. The objects were huge wooden spools for industrial cable cut into a triangle, a pentagon, etc. At a recent outing, my second grader got to eat her lunch in the full-size tepee, complete with a fire in the middle.

You never know. If you pass the Leinbach's house on 5th St., you may see Ken and Shauna practicing juggling in the front yard. Or you may see Ken juggling with some friends down in Four Mile Run park. If so, don't hesitate to join in. Ken will be happy to get you started too.

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MetroRail Schedule

In January we revealed that the Barcroft Bus has a schedule. When you get to the Pentagon to transfer to MetroRail, the trains have a schedule too. If you know when your train is leaving, you know whether you have to hustle down the escalator to catch it.

The Yellow Line trains to Mount Vernon Square leave the Pentagon every six minutes in the morning. They leave on the hour and every six minutes thereafter, so if you arrive at the Pentagon at 7:26 AM, you just missed the 7:24 Yellow Line train and have plenty of time before the next one. The Blue Line for Rosslyn, Foggy Bottom, and downtown leaves at six-minute intervals beginning three minutes after the hour; so at 7:25 AM, you have two minutes to get down to the platform and onto the train. Other transfer points have similar regular schedules, although the frequency of the trains can be dif-

ferent. The Yellow Line leaves Gallery Place for the Pentagon in the afternoon on the hour and every 12 minutes thereafter. Asking the station attendants about the schedules can relieve your anxiety about catching your train and make hurrying unnecessary most of the time.

Relief for Seniors

Arlington residents 65 or older and some disabled residents may be eligible for a deferral or partial exemption from the County real estate tax. To qualify, the property must be your primary residence, your gross income for 1993 may not exceed \$40,000 for deferral or \$20,000 for partial exemption, and the combined assets (excluding the house) of all owners must not exceed \$150,000 for deferral or \$75,000 for partial exemption. 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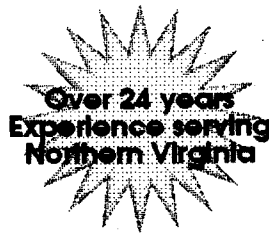
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
